Jerry's involvement at ICS is focused on the golf event. He uses every opportunity to recruit players and sponsors! So it isn't surprising to hear that he was talking "golf talk" across the counter at a local eatery.

That's what was happening on a recent day when he was encouraging "**Linda**" to help obtain a raffle item from her boss at a local resort.

When Jerry pulled out the ICS brochure...her mouth dropped open. "Oh my gosh, is that the organization you work with? I can't believe that you are talking to me. This is the organization that helped me two years ago."

Then she told her story.

An accident left her partially paralyzed and out of work. She turned to ICS who helped her with rent,

utilities, and even Mobile Meals for a short time.

"I could have never made it without this help. Not only that, but it was the holiday time and I had no money to buy gifts for my young children. Some wonderful people brought us wrapped gifts and even an artificial tree. You know, I still have this tree and I'll never get rid of it."

Moments like this are wonderful reminders of why ICS exists and how your support – volunteer and financial – makes a difference. Thank you for helping our next door neighbors - those who need just a little extra help to stay independent or make it through a crisis.

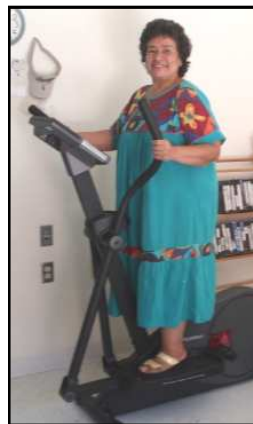


## Thank You

# University Medical Center: Our family caring for yours

A mother gives birth to her first child, a young man arrives in the emergency department following a serious motorcycle accident, a wife donates a kidney to her ailing husband, a tiny infant's heart heals itself while on a special pump called the Berlin Heart, and a woman with leukemia prepares for a life-saving blood and marrow transplant.

All of these remarkable events, along with many others, make up the typical day at University Medical Center. UMC's role as Arizona's primary teaching hospital, with its world-class heart, cancer, transplant, trauma and pediatrics treatment centers, make University Medical Center a compelling place where, on any given day, extraordinary stories can be told.

### **Recognized for service and caring**

UMC is a private, non-profit, 355-bed hospital affiliated with the University of Arizona and the UA Colleges of Medicine, Pharmacy and Nursing.

As it has for the past several years, *U.S. News & World Report* named UMC one of "America's Best Hospitals" for 2008. This year UMC was ranked among the top 50 hospitals in the country in five specialty areas.

UMC is Southern Arizona's only Level 1 trauma center and comprehensive transplantation center. It was the first "Nurse Magnet" hospital in Arizona, recognized by the American Nurses Credentialing Center for the excellence of its nursing staff.

UMC is also a Thomson 100 Top Hospital—recognition earned for excellence in clinical outcomes, patient safety, financial performance, efficiency and other benchmarks when compared against their peers.

And the hospital was honored this year with a Workplace of Excellence Award, recognizing it as one of Tucson's most progressive and desirable employers.

### **Our bright future**

You may have noticed a six-story structure currently under construction on UMC's main campus to serve the growing needs of the Tucson community. The ground floor of the new building will hold an expanded Trauma Center, Emergency department and Children's Emergency area, which will open in the spring of next year. The second and third floors, scheduled to open in the fall of 2009, will contain medical, surgical and intensive care beds.

The new 112-bed Diamond Children's Medical Center, scheduled to open in 2010, will occupy the top three floors of this building and will have its own dedicated entrance and elevator. Diamond Children's will be a "family-centered" pediatric hospital, where the hospitalized child's parents are actively involved in all aspects of the child's care, and the design of the hospital accommodates families' physical, psychological, social and spiritual needs.

Affiliated with the UA Steele Children's Research Center, the facility will provide the best possible care for children and will bring pediatric care in Tucson to a new level.

## Health ministry workshop scheduled

Previous issues of the newsletter have charted the initiation of ICS's Health and Wholeness Project. Building on our successful Health Advocacy office, this project encourages congregations to address the "whole-person" health issues of their congregants and community—spiritual, physical, emotional, and relational.

**Karen MacDonald**, Faith Community Outreach Manager, and **Maricela Reynaert**, Health Advocacy Coordinator, are talking with leaders of congregations regarding starting or expanding their own health programs. Two faith communities are actively working on organizing comprehensive health programs.

Also, ICS is collaborating with the Carondelet Foundation to present a workshop for those interested in fostering health ministry. Called **A Genesis: Congregation-Based Health Program Workshop**, this two-day offering is open to laypeople, clergy, nurses, other

medical workers, and anyone interested in exploring health ministry or developing congregational health programs.

The purpose of the workshop will be three-fold:

- To explain the process of starting a congregational health program.
- To deepen their understanding of the faith-health connection;
- To explore the congregation's role as a center for health and healing.

This event will be held October 23-24, 2008 at the **Redemptorist Renewal Center** in Picture Rocks. The registration fee is \$50, which includes meals both days.
